Her consideration of "Gothic Displacements" will orient us for the remainder of the conference. Please join us Saturday morning for the plenary panel, moderated by Dr. Sobol and beginning at 8:30 A.M. Throughout the day on Saturday and Sunday there will be panels from across the disciplines that address all areas of Eastern Europe and Eurasia. On a happier note, Saturday we will celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Society for Slovene Studies, with a dramatic reading of Ivan Cankar's play *Jakob Ruda* and this year non-student attendees can attend a special Slovenian wine-tasting evening at the Barnett Center in Sullivant Hall. Please enter from the High Street entrance to the building.

As I wrote last year, when our conference focused on climate change and environmental catastrophe, one of the ways we can face the future is to continue our work studying this region from multiple perspectives, sharing critical analyses and viewpoints and creating a supportive scholarly community for researchers, teachers, and students. We are grateful to you for joining us this weekend for our Midwest Slavic Conference, made possible through the participation of faculty and students from across the region, the country, and the globe.

As this year's conference explores the theme of displacement and diaspora we hope to facilitate discussions on how war has displaced and damaged cultures and societies and but has also prompted them to flourish while creating new centers and pulls across the globe when citizens are forced to flee. The keynote address and plenary panel will build upon this year's theme, while numerous papers and panels throughout the conference will explore these topics and more from a variety of different disciplinary perspectives and in a range of countries.

"Gothic Displacement and the Russian Imperial Conquest: Literary Cases of Finland and Ukraine"



Keynote Address by Dr. Valeria Sobol (U. of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign)

Dr. Valeria Sobol is a Professor of Slavic Languages and Literatures at the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign. Her primary research interests include Russian literature and science, the Gothic literary tradition, empire and race studies. She is the author of *Febris Erotica: Lovesickness in the Russian Literary Imagination* (2009); *Haunted Empire: Gothic and the Russian Imperial Uncanny* (2020), and a co-editor (with Mark Steinberg) of the volume *Interpreting Emotions in Russia and Eastern Europe* (2011). She has also published numerous articles on eighteenth- and nineteenth-century Russian literature, as well as on Ukrainian literature. She is the recipient of the Prize for the Best Article in the field of Ukrainian history, politics, lan-

guage, literature and culture (2018-19) from the American Association for Ukrainian Studies.

Dr. Anna Barker, U. of Iowa

Dr. Anna Barker received her Ph.D. in Comparative Literature in 2002 with a dissertation in translation studies. At the University of Iowa, she has taught courses on English literature, comparative literature, and Russian literature. Her areas of interest include 19th-century Russian and European literature, Russian cultural history, and opera. Dr. Barker regularly leads online literary tutorials. Her current tutorial, 30 Days of Gustave Flaubert's *Madame Bovary*, is conducted in anticipation of the September 1-December 10 100 Days of *Anna Karenina* this fall, commemorating 150 years since the start of the novel's composition. In collaboration with the University of Iowa Libraries Special Collections, Dr Barker curated the exhibition "Goya's *Disasters of War* and Tolstoy's *War and Peace*: A Dialogue Between Art and Literature" (2019) and "From Revolutionary Outcast to a Man of God: Dostoevsky at 200" (2021).

Dr. Philip Gleissner, Ohio State U.

Dr. Philip Gleissner specializes in the cultures and literatures of socialist Eastern Europe, with an emphasis on print media in the Soviet Union, Czechoslovakia, and the GDR. He is particularly interested in media as agents of mobility: mechanisms that facilitate the transnational circulation of cultural forms within and beyond Eastern Europe. Dr. Gleissner is currently finishing his first monograph titled *Subscribing to Sovietdom: The Lives of the Socialist Literary Journal*. The book traces how these periodicals moderated multidirectional networks that connected the cultures of the Soviet Union, Eastern Europe, and the West. Other current research projects include the edited volumes *Red Migrations: Marxism and Mobility after 1917* (with Bradley Gorski, Georgetown; forthcoming with Toronto UP) and *Lockdown in the Visional Immigrant Foodwares in Times of Crisis* (with Harry Voshdan, Penn; forth

Kitchen: American Immigrant Foodways in Times of Crisis (with Harry Kashdan, Penn; forthcoming with Rutgers UP).

Dr. Jarosław Szczepański, U. of Warsaw

Dr. Jarosław Szczepański holds a double Ph.D. in law and political science, both from the University of Warsaw. His main area of research lies in the field of comparative studies and axiological foundations of political systems and decision-making processes. He is an assistant professor at the Faculty of Political Science and International Studies, University of Warsaw, and a lecturer at the Institute of Legal Studies of the Academy of Justice. Fulbright Scholar at the Ohio State University (2021). Most recently Visiting Scholar at Victoria University of Wellington (2023) where he was engaged in a comparative study of free travel areas: Schengen Zone and Trans-Tasman Travel Arrangement.

President: Dr. Timothy Pogačar, Bowling Green State U.

Timothy Pogačar received degrees from Georgetown University and the University of Kansas, where he wrote a dissertation on Russian literature and the journal *Iunost*'. He joined the faculty of Bowling Green State U. in 1985 and chaired the Department of German, Russian and East Asian Languages from 1998 to 2017. He has edited the journal *Slovene Studies* since 1994. As an executive council member of the Society for Slovene Studies, he took part in the launch of the Slovene Research Initiative at The Ohio State University. Pogačar has translated seven contemporary novels from Slovene. His most recent book translation is of Ivan Tavčar's novel *The Visoko Chronicle* (2022). Pogačar has published articles on



Tavčar, emigration, and his American émigré relative (2021); and two articles on fiction in the Slovene-American newspaper *Prosveta* (2021). Current research topics are sound preferences for personal names in translation and translated fiction in twentieth-century Slavic-American periodicals.

<u>2023 Midwest Slavic Association Student Essay Prize</u> <u>Competition</u>

The Midwest Slavic Association, with support from the Association for Slavic, East European, and Eurasian Studies (ASEEES), is now accepting submissions for its annual essay prize competition for undergraduate and graduate students. Students can submit a paper on any topic related to Slavic, East European, and Eurasian studies to the Midwest Slavic Association for consideration. The best undergraduate paper received will win a one-year membership to ASEEES, and the graduate winner will receive a oneyear membership to ASEEES, as well as then being considered for the ASEEES Graduate Student Essay Prize national level competition. The graduate winner of the ASEEES Student Essay Prize at the national level wins travel, lodging, and registration for the Annual ASEEES Convention and membership for the following year. The prize is presented during the awards presentation at the Annual Convention.

Undergraduate paper submissions can be in a variety of formats, including: conference paper, thesis, course paper, or article. They should be no longer than 20 double-spaced pages including notes and bibliography. Entries must be submitted electronically and written in English.


Graduate essay submissions can be of several formats: expanded versions of conference papers, graduate level seminar papers, Master's thesis chapters, or dissertation chapters. The student should indicate what type of paper they are submitting and provide an abstract. Essays should have a minimum word count of 7,500 and a maximum word count of 14,000 (25 to 50 pages approximately) inclusive of footnotes and bibliography. Submissions must be written in English, double-spaced, and include footnotes or endnotes.

All submissions are due on Monday, May 1, 2023 and should be emailed to <u>cseees@osu.edu</u>. Students who wish to submit an essay should have participated in the Midwest Slavic Conference, or be from an institution in the Midwest (defined as any college or university in the states of **Illinois, Indi-ana, Iowa, Kentucky, Ohio, Michigan, Minnesota, and Wisconsin**). With your submission, please also include a short bio of the author, an abstract of the essay, and indicate the format of the essay. 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

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
